Heart of the Revolution

Halifax was established in 1757 as a trading center on the Roanoke River. It became a recruiting center during the Revolutionary War. On April 12, 1776 the Fourth Provincial Congress met in Halifax and adopted the first official resolution by an entire colony recommending independence from England. The Fifth Provincial Congress also met here, and created North Carolina's first state constitution and appointed Richard Caswell as the first governor.
